Parking for Persons with Disabilities

Parking placards for persons with disabilities identify vehicles with riders and drivers who have a mobility impairments that require a disabled parking stall. The program is statewide and applies to all four Counties. The fines for parking in a reserved handicap parking space without a disabled placard or license plate may be as high as \$500.00.

If you are traveling to Hawaii, please bring your disability parking placard from your home state. Disability parking placards from all U.S. states are recognized in Hawaii and allow you to use designated disability parking while you are visiting Hawaii.

Types and Fees of Parking Permits for Persons with Disabilities

- ***Six Year Removable Windshield Placard.*** Your disability is expected to last for at least 6 years. No fee.
- ***Temporary Removable Windshield Placard.*** Your disability is expected to last from 1 to 6 months. \$12 fee.
- ***Second Temporary removable windshield placard*** upon request. \$12 fee for a second Temporary placard.
- ***Special License Plates.*** Your disability is expected to last for at least 6 years and you are the registered owner of the vehicle. \$5.50 fee.

Metered Parking Fees with Disability Parking Placard

If you have a disability parking placard displayed, State and county metered parking spaces are free for 2½ hours or the maximum amount of time of the meter, whichever is longer. For State and county parking lots with an attendant, usual parking fees apply since the attendant will assist disabled persons making payments for parking fees.
